Neighborhood Watch



On Wednesday, April 24, 2002, the first Block Captain Meeting was held at 3350 Carly Lane. Sergeant Matthew Grimes was back again to discuss with those people who had agreed to be Block Captains their duties.

The following people will be calling on you in the next few weeks to deliver information about our Neighborhood Watch. Unfortunately, the entire neighborhood will not be covered. If your area is not covered and you have one hour a month you can give to the neighborhood, please contact Skip Donnell, the Neighborhood Watch Coordinator, to volunteer.

You will notice that some of these people have agreed to take on areas that are not near their homes and more than the recommended 10 homes per Block Captain.

The duties of the Block Captain are few and very simple. The Block Captain will personally introduce themselves to the residents of the homes they have been assigned. They will give the homeowner an EMERGENCY 911 magnet, with their phone number on it, a sticker to put in the window that will advertise that the homeowner is a participant in the Neighborhood Watch and several pamphlets discussing Crime and Prevention. The Block Captain will also be asking the homeowner for their phone number and email address (this information will not be published), the purpose of gathering this information is so the Block Captain will be able to contact the homeowner if there is an unusual occurrence or crime has been committed in our neighborhood.

If you are the victim of a crime, the very first thing you should do is contact 911 and report it. The same stands true for reporting an unusual occurrence, always contact the authorities first. Once this has been done and all has calmed down, then you

should contact your Block Captain and report it, who it turn will contact the Neighborhood Coordinator, who will then contact the other Block Captains and then all Block Captains will contact those homeowners who have expressed interest in participating.

Please note the only information that will be shared is the basics, for example, there was a break in the 3300 block of Carly Way, on Monday, May 1, sometime in the early afternoon.

The purpose of sharing this information is to keep our neighborhood safe and for all homeowners to know what is happening around them.

I know, I know – how can I make such a cruel statement. Well, I'll tell you what, deal with some of the people that we have to deal with as VOL-UNTEER members of the Board of the Cherry Lake Homeowners Association and you would know exactly why I make this statement. Not only is our job thankless and we receive no monetary compensation for it, but we are also forced to deal with the rude and thoughtless ravings of homeowners living here that are just to apathetic to see the big picture.

Why, on God's green earth would anybody call up and scream a message that "I am not going to pay my dues

Why, on God's green earth would anybody call up and scream a message that "I am not going to pay my dues. I did not like the way you plowed the snow three years ago so I am not going to pay" on a board members answering machine. Not once but TWICE!

My response to that is simple – why don't you try getting off of your apathetic backside and join in and see how good of a job you can do? But, we already know the answer to that – don't we – that would require a certain level of commitment and effort on your part. Obviously, from your failure to pay your dues commitment is not a word that you have in your vocabulary!

While I am on the topic of dues lets just go for broke. I am continually asked what our dues are for. It did not snow this year so why should you charge me this year?

Fine – that is a very fair

question. What are the dues used for? Well, if it were not for the dues then we could not pay the electric bill that powers the light at entrance to our neighborhood. We could not pay the insurance that we are required to carry on the property at the front entrance. We could not have the grass mowed at the front entrance. There would be no flowers or mulch at the front entrance. We could not publish this Newsletter (which is required by Federal law). And yes – there is always the snow plowing cost – when the weather calls for it.

This year though we have a "special" project. We are going to have to replace the sign at the entrance to our neighborhood. It is old, reflects poorly on our neighborhood, is broken and is not as "modern" as those going up in the neighborhoods that we are directly competing with in the real estate market.

We are currently working on quotes for this sign project but I can tell you this – IT IS NOT GOING TO BE CHEAP! We have been very fortunate over the past couple of winters not to need a tremendous amount of snow plowing. We have been able to save a little bit of money to help offset this expense. However, what we have saved will go just so far. After that, it is the responsibility of ALL of the residents of the neighborhood to pay the bill for this sign. The Board has the right to levy a "Special Dues" to pay for capital expenditures like this. And, if those of you that have not yet paid your 2002 (and previous years if applicable)

dues do not get off the stick, they we will have to do just that. We will get the new sign, pay what we can out of our bank account and then, divide the rest of the amount due by the 275 homes in the neighborhood and then send you all the bill. The thing about this levy is that it is a **MANDATORY** compliance issue. If you choose not to comply, then the Cherry Lake Homeowners Association **WILL** place a lien against your property. What that means is that when you go to sell you will not have a clear title to your property until you have cleared your debt with us. At that time the expense will be not only the "Special Due" but also the expense incurred in placing the lien, and your outstanding dues from previous years.

Our dues are \$40 / year. That is less than the cost of a bottle of Coke a week! By the way – in case you did not know – we have one of the lowest dues of any neighborhood in the city of Indianapolis. You think the dues are bad here then move to another neighborhood. Then, let me know how you feel about \$100+ / month!

You ask why we even bother to have a Homeowners Association? That is simple – the city of Indianapolis requires that all Planned Urban Developments (PUDs) – and Cherry Lake is listed as a PUD with the city - have a board to work to maintain the value of the homes in the neighborhood.

Take my word for it, failure to help out financially with the neighborhood is not the only

way of being apathetic. Let's talk about yard care. Trash in the front yard. Grass that is ten inches tall. Cars parked in the front and back yard. Using the street as your own personal parking lot / RV & BOAT storage lot.

All are signs of apathy. You do not care about how your friends and neighbor feel. You do not care that somebody may miss out on the sell of their home because you and your habits are so distracting. All you know is that "I'm gonna do whatever I want and you have no control over me." Ironically when you go to sell your house and your realtor says that there is no way you can get that

much out of your home because of the way the neighborhood looks you will be the first one complaining AGAIN!

We are all busy. There is never enough time in the day anymore. But how long does it take to cut your grass? If you do not have the time, pay somebody to do it for you. Park your vehicles in your driveway. Store your RVs and Boats at a storage facility. Just doing these simple items will go a long way with what the real estate companies call "curb appeal".

Everybody in the neighborhood has made a substantial financial investment to own

his or her own house. Unfortunately, the actions of a few apathetic individuals can severely undermine all the work and effort that we are putting forth.

We Can All Help Revive Our Urban Areas

One potential barrier to revitalization of urban areas is negative public perception, which can deter new investment. When I think of negative public perception, I can't help but think of the far-east side and media attention surrounding the recent departures of many retailers from that area. Articles on this topic have referred to this area as the "least" side of town.

However, absent from the coverage was the fact that, in many cases, the departures of those business had as much to do with national trends and widespread multiple closures as they did with that particular area. Also absent from most coverage was mention of any of the new investment of well-organized efforts by a number of individuals and groups to improve that area.

While I do not advocate the "stick your head in the sand" approach of ignoring departing businesses, I can't see how it helps to focus only on the negative.

The question that remains is,

how can we build on the advantages of core urban areas and at the same time work through some of the challenges?

While I readily admit this is not the be-all-end-all solution, in the far-east side example, focusing at least some attention on the positive is a first step. Some of the new investments in that area include: the construction and opening of a Home Depot store at 22nd and Post Road; substantial new investment by Kroger stores on east 38th Street and other nearby locations; Cisco Seeds' purchasing the long-vacant Builder's Square site; the substantial growth and continued investment of several local companies, including Sports Graphics Inc; and infrastructures and aesthetic improvement facilitated by state and local government through curb cuts, sidewalk and road repairs.

Other work from a variety of partners including government, private sectors and community organizations will be essential to promoting economic develop-

ment and assuring that strategies are in place that will increase wealth and economic opportunities. The city is doing its part to improve aesthetics through aggressive code enforcements. Community organizations are also acting aggressively to make noticeable differences by spearheading mass cleanup efforts, including the Warren Pride Day trash-removal effort.

While none of these efforts alone will make huge impact, the hope is that, in concert, they will lay the foundation for economic opportunities and growth. Ideally, after the areas gets past some of the challenges outlined above, some of the inherent advantage of high population densities and potential collective purchasing power for local goods will shine through and continue a national trend toward healthy and vital areas.

Notes of Interest

DUMPING

It has been brought to the attention of the Board that we have a problem with DUMPING.

It is ILLEGAL to DUMP in our neighborhood, specifically at the dead end of Carly Way and Cherry Lake Road.

The FINE is \$25,000 and the homeowners in that area will call and report any one seen dumping in this area.

MOTORIZED BIKES (Dirt Bikes) and ATVs or UTVs

Unlicensed vehicles may not be operated within Cherry Lake. This includes, but is not limited to mini-bikes, dirt bikes, sand buggies, etc.

We encourage all homeowners

who see these vehicles in our neighborhood to contact the Marion County Sheriff's Department immediately at 327.3811.

IC 9-21-11-12

Sec. 12. A motorized bicycle may not be operated under any of the following conditions:

- (1) By a person less than fifteen (15) years of age.
- (2) By a person who has not obtained an identification card under IC 9-24, a permit under IC 9-24, an operator's license under IC 9-24, a chauffeur's license under IC 9-24, or a public passenger chauffeur's license under IC 9-24.
- (3) On an interstate highway or a sidewalk.
- (4) At a speed greater than twenty-five (25) miles per hour.

IC 9-21-11-14

Sec. 14. A person who violates

this chapter commits a Class C infraction.

Sergeant Matthew Grimes has assured us the Marion County Sheriff's Department will respond to our calls and will talk directly with the parents of the children who are found riding these vehicles. Warnings and Fines will be issued.

Pet Peeves

One of the four classic challenges of living in a community is dogs. (The others are children, garbage and parking). People are extremely fond of their pets and simply cannot understand why others get upset when they run loose, bark or mess up the grounds.

One solution if a pet is annoying you, talk with the owner first before becoming upset and angry. In most cases owners are cooperative and embarrassed when the issue is brought to their attention.

If this doesn't work, your next alternative is to know the Law.

Our Covenants and Restrictions state:

19 Animals. No farm animals, fowl or domestic animals for commercial purposes shall be permitted on the Property. General recognized house pets are permitted in reasonable numbers. All pets when outside must be kept under control by their owners and must not become a nuisance to other residents.

Indiana Law reads as follows:

IC 15-5-12

Chapter 12. Liability for Dog Bites

IC 15-5-12-1

Sec. 1. If a dog, without provocation, bites any person who is peaceably conducting himself in any place where he may be required

to go for the purpose of discharging any duty imposed upon him by the laws of this state or by the laws or postal regulations of the United

States of America, the owner of such dog may be held liable for any

damages suffered by the person bitten, regardless of the former viciousness of such dog or the owner's knowledge of such viciousness.

(Formerly: Acts 1951, c.37, s.1.)

IC 15-5-12-2

Sec. 2. As used in this chapter, "owner" means the owner of a dog.

The term includes a possessor, keeper, or harbinger of a dog.

As added by P.L. 176-1993, SEC.1.

IC 15-5-12-3

Sec. 3. (a) An owner of a dog commits a Class C misdemeanor if the

owner recklessly, knowingly, or intentionally fails to take reasonable

steps to restrain the dog and:

(1) the dog enters property other than the property of the dog's owner; and

(2) as the result of the failure to restrain the dog, the dog bites or attacks another person resulting in unprovoked bodily injury to the other person;

except as provided in subsection (b).

(b) The offense under subsection (a) is:

(1) a Class B misdemeanor if the person has been convicted of

one (1) previous unrelated violation of this section;

(2) a Class A misdemeanor if:

(A) the person has been convicted of more than one (1) previous unrelated violation of this section; or

(B) the violation results in serious bodily injury to a person;

(3) a Class D felony if the owner recklessly violates this section and the violation results in the death of a person; and

(4) a Class C felony if the owner intentionally or knowingly violates this section and the violation results in the death of a person.

As added by P.L. 176-1993, SEC.2.

IC 15-5-12-4

Sec. 4. An owner of a dog is exempt under section 3 of this chapter

if the dog commits an act described in section 3 of this chapter during

the period that the dog is owned by:

(1) the United States;

(2) an agency of the United

States; or

(3) a governmental entity (as defined in IC 34-6-2-49); and the dog is engaged in assisting the owner or the owner's agent in the performance of law enforcement or military duties.

The above only covers bites, there are also the ordinances that call for all pets to be licensed.

A Pet Policy is just one of the items that needs to be addressed by the Steering Committee as we begin the process of rewriting our Covenants and Restrictions. If you are interested and want to be involved, call any board member or just show up at the open monthly board meetings on the 2nd Tuesday of every month.
